

t is with great enthusiasm that I can officially welcome you back to the fire stations! For several years now, our organization has been on the front lines of the global pandemic, backed by the strong support of our amazing community. It has been a long journey for all of us, and one we're not entirely done tackling together, but we are excited for the ability to begin opening our doors to the public again. We also have numerous great projects and developments in the works that will make 2022 one of our best years yet.

The ability for our community members to enter the fire stations means a lot to us. With the last of the COVID-19 mandates lifted for our stations,

we have forged ahead with safe and healthy event planning, one of which is our certified CPR classes.

Providing our community members with a lowcost means of learning the CPR, AED and first aid skills necessary to help keep their loved ones and fellow community members safe in the critical minutes before our firefighters can arrive is crucial to our vision for Renton. Our classes take place at Fire Station 13 and are available to those over the age of 12 with an adult, and over the age of 16 without. Another event we're excited to announce is our upcoming Scout Night. Spear-headed by our Public Education team and supported by our public service partners from the City of Renton and the Renton Police Department, we will once again welcome scouts from throughout Renton to join us and make strides toward their badges on several safety topics. That event will take place on June 1, 2022, at Fire Station 14. Expect to see more announcements about this exciting event on our social media accounts in the coming months: @rentonrfa.

I am sograteful to you, our community, for passing Proposition 1 in the fall of 2021. This measure will allow us to continue receiving the funding necessary to best serve the Renton community. We have several capital improvement projects that we are working hard on in 2022. Those projects include a remodel at Fire Station 14 to better house our growing Office of the Fire Marshal team, and a remodel at Fire Station 11, which is utilizing a grant to partially fund the installation of a sprinkler system in the crew quarters—saving taxpayers while improving the safety of our firefighters. In addition, we will be receiving two new engines and aid cars to replace apparatus in our aging fleet over the next few months.

Perhaps the most exciting project is the reconstruction of Fire Station 16. We are working diligently on a land acquisition for the location of this new station. Station 16 is our oldest station, and we have known for a long time that its reconstruction is imminent. To approach this project in the most fiscally responsible way, our board and organization agree that the purchase of a new property and fresh construction is the best course of action for Renton and Fire District 25. We are very excited about this opportunity and will be bringing you more information in coming news releases.

Lastly, I want to share my gratitude for our community's ongoing support. I recently finished my first official year as your new fire chief, and I am humbled by the overwhelmingly positive feedback and participation that we receive from Renton community members daily. Thank you for making what we do possible.

SAFETY

SPRING SAFETY TIPS

W ith warmer weather and longer days approaching, spring cleaning, home repairs and yard work are at the top of the to-do list. Add fire safety to your todo list to ensure our homes and yards are safe from dangerous material and unsafe conditions.

Reduce your chances of an accidental home fire that starts outdoors by removing leaves, pine needles, and other flammable materials from your roof and gutters. Take time to remove any dead vegetation and other flammable materials from around your home's exterior. Also, keep construction materials, trash, and woodpiles away from the home to prevent an accidental fire from spreading to your home. inquiries about rules and regulations for fire pits or recreational fires.

What can I burn outside? The only outdoor burning allowed is for recreational fires on your own private property. A recreational fire is defined as an outdoor fire burning charcoal, dried firewood, or manufactured fire logs, for pleasure, religious, ceremonial, cooking, warmth, or similar purposes. Fires used for debris disposal purposes are NOT considered recreational fires.

What are the rules for recreational fires? Recreational fires are restricted to a pile that is no larger than three (3) feet in diameter

Grilling Safety

Summer brings the peak for outdoor cooking season. Every year over 10,000 home fires are started by grills each year. The leading causes of home grilling fires are failing to properly clean the grill or having a flammable object too close to the grill. It's also important to check the grill for damage before using it for the first time each year and then to check it regularly.

Barbecue grills are designed for outdoor use only. Never barbecue in your trailer, tent, house, garage,

In addition:

- Never throw cigarettes into vegetation, potted plants or landscaping, peat moss, dried grasses, mulch, leaves, or other similar items—they can easily catch fire.
- When refueling your lawn mower, make sure the engine is off and cool. Don't spill gasoline on a hot engine.

Fire Pit Safety & Regulations

In the spring and summer, we receive

and two (2) feet in height. They must be at least 25 feet away from any structure or combustible material (dry grass, wooden fences, or decks, etc.).

The fire must be constantly attended and at least one portable fire extinguisher with a minimum of 4-A rating or other approved on-site fire extinguishing equipment, such as an operational garden hose, readily available.

Burning is not allowed when a burn ban is in effect. Additionally, any recreational fire that is bothersome to your neighbors must be extinguished. or any closed area, as carbon monoxide may accumulate and create a life-threatening hazard.

- Position the grill in an open area at least 10 feet away from buildings, deck railings and out from under eaves and overhanging branches.
- Use barbecue utensils with long handles to avoid burns and splatters.
- Wear short or tight-fitting sleeves and use flame-retardant mitts.
- Never leave a lit grill unattended.

Additionally, Fairwood residents will continue to receive the Fire District 40 quarterly newsletter, as well as this bi-annual Renton RFA newsletter, to stay up-to-date on our activities and resources in Fairwood, as well as Renton as a whole.

A NEW FRONTIER FOR LOGISTICS

R enton RFA continually seeks improvement in all areas of our organization, and we take our stewardship of public funding very seriously. One area we have seen significant positive change in is our Logistics section.

Over the last several years, we moved from a cross-dock logistics process, in which each station would do their own inventory management and ordering, to a stocking process, where our Logistics team would house a central supply of inventory and replenish the stations on a routine basis. While the stocking process solved many logistical issues, one persistent issue was the sheer time involved in manually managing inventory for seven stations and a warehouse. This is thousands of items to track and maintain, many with unique expiry dates or maintenance needs. able to partner with a vendor, Life Assist, to gain access to an operations management software called Operative IQ. This software contains a robust inventory management module, and thanks to our great relationship with Life Assist, we have been able to access this portion of the tool at no cost!

Operative IQ has allowed our team to save an estimated 93% of the time previously spent managing inventory levels. Additionally, the system automates key equipment and supply tasks, such as managing equipment maintenance schedules and supply expiry dates. This helps ensure costly equipment, such as chainsaws, are maintained to the highest standard and items like medical supplies are never past their best-use date. This only scratches the surface of the program's capabilities, and we are excited to utilize this system to its full capacity.
