SUBJECT: **Renton Regional Fire Authority Chief's Report**

1. Leadership Roles at Valley Comm and SKCFTC

December marks my last meetings as the Chair of the Valley Communications Center (VCC) Operations Committee Chair, the fire liaison to the VCC Admin Board, and the Chair of the SKCFTC Admin Board. I have served in these three positions for the last two years and look forward to seeing what opportunities come next.

2. Salvation Army Red Kettle Volunteers

Renton RFA members volunteered to ring the bell for the Salvation Army Red Kettle Campaign on December 7th from 10am - 12pm at the Fred Meyer on Rainier Avenue. This annual campaign helps raise funds to support community programs such as food assistance, shelter, and holiday support for families in need. The funds collected will directly benefit local programs to ensure vulnerable community members have access to meals, safe housing, and the resources needed to celebrate the holiday season with dignity. Renton RFA is proud to contribute to this impactful cause and appreciates the community's generosity in making the campaign a success.

3. 2024 Adopt-A-Family

This holiday season, Renton RFA is proud to continue its partnership with IAFF Local 864 Firefighters and Communities in Schools of Renton to bring joy to families in need. Firefighter Emilie Garza has stepped up to lead the program this year, taking the reins from Lt. Kayla West who had coordinated the event for the past five years with great dedication.

Together, the fire stations and day staff team will sponsor eight families to provide them with holiday gifts and meals. On Monday, December 23rd, Santa and his elves will deliver the gifts aboard the Union Pumper. If inclement weather arises, the brush rig will be ready to ensure the deliveries go as planned to spread holiday cheer to the community.

4. 2024 Battle of the Badges

On Saturday, December 14th, Renton RFA is participating in the annual Battle of the Badges event hosted by Renton PD on the Renton Technical College campus. This event is a food drive and walk-through holiday light display competition between law enforcement and healthcare agencies from the surrounding area at the local and state level. Our theme this year is "Elf Spy Academy," complete with an ADA compliant obstacle course for attendees to receive their diploma and official *Elf Spy Academy* badge. 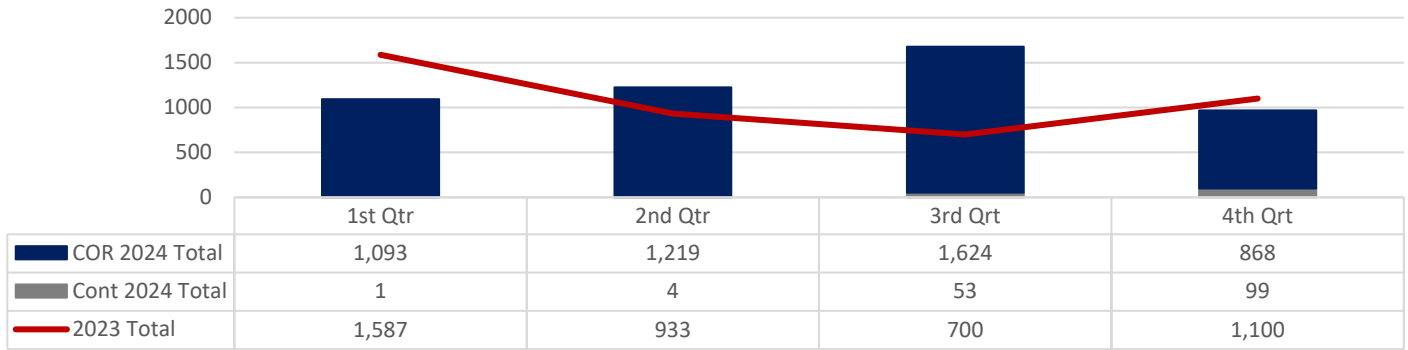

Staff have completed 4,961 inspections (business, multi-family, IFC permit, special, complaint & re-inspections) year to date.

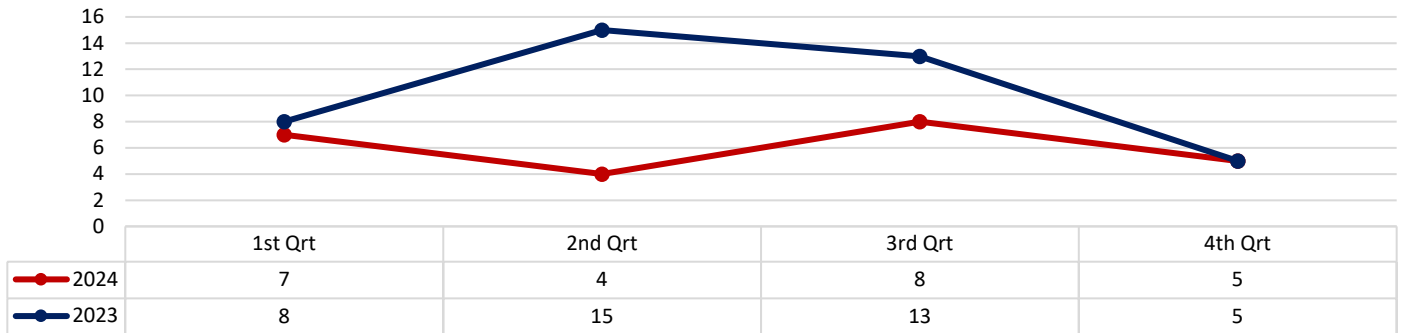
Inspections Completed by Quarter - Comparative to 2023



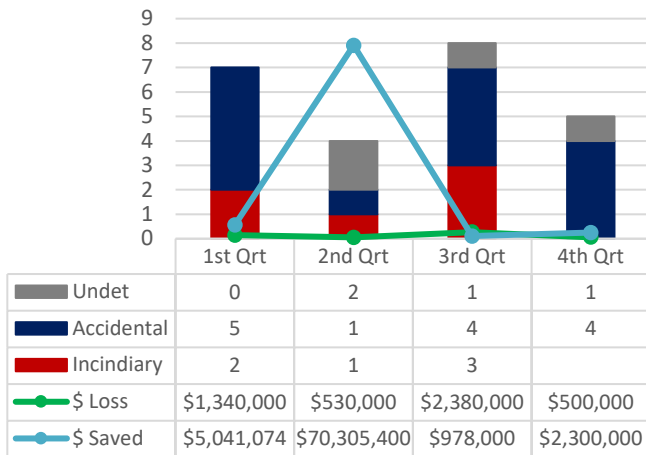
Fire Investigations

Staff investigated 4 fires in November. Total dollar loss for the year is estimated at \$4.8 million, and an estimated \$106 million in saved property.

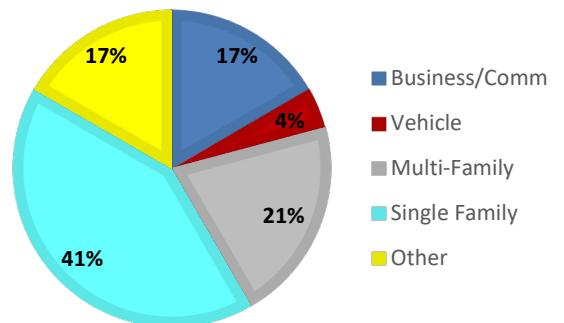
Fire Investigations by Quarter - Comparative to 2023



FIRE CAUSE AND LOSS ESTIMATE



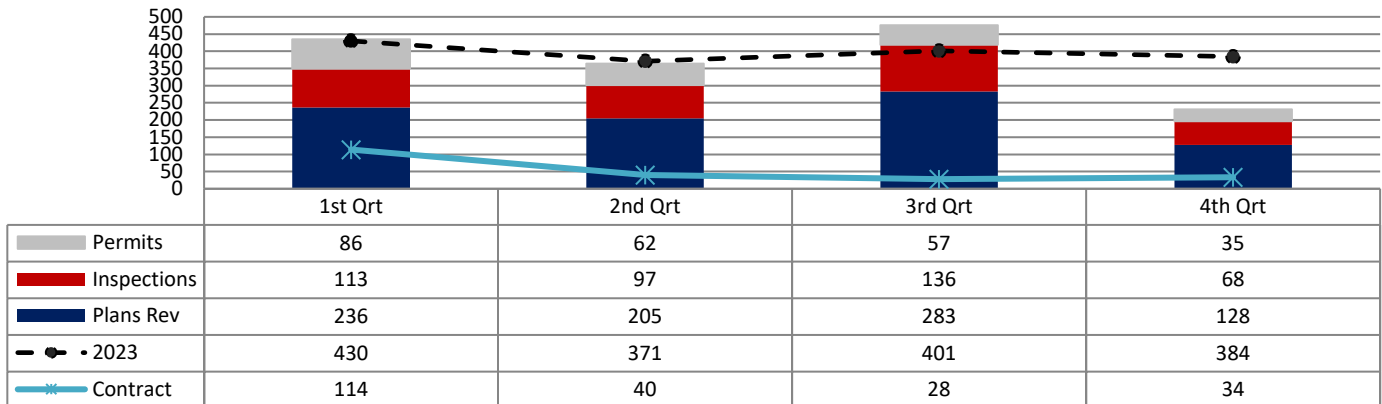
PROPERTY TYPE OF INVESTIGATED FIRES

Plans Review, Construction Inspections & Permits by Quarter - Comparative to 2023



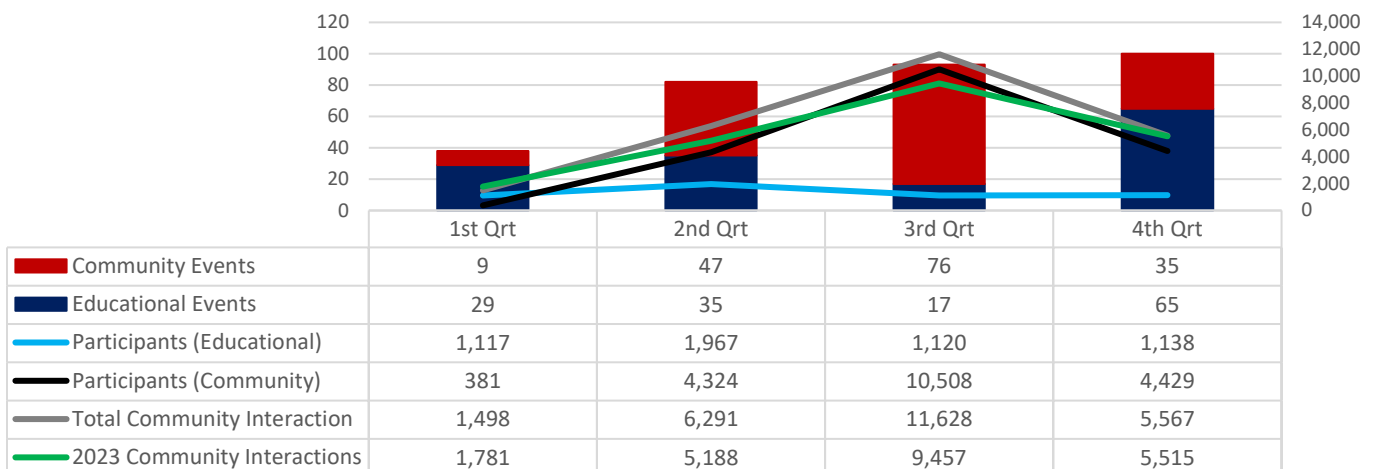
Public Education / Community Outreach Highlights

The Department participated in 11 educational events, reaching 203 attendees and an additional 21 community events, reaching 1,294 attendees in November.



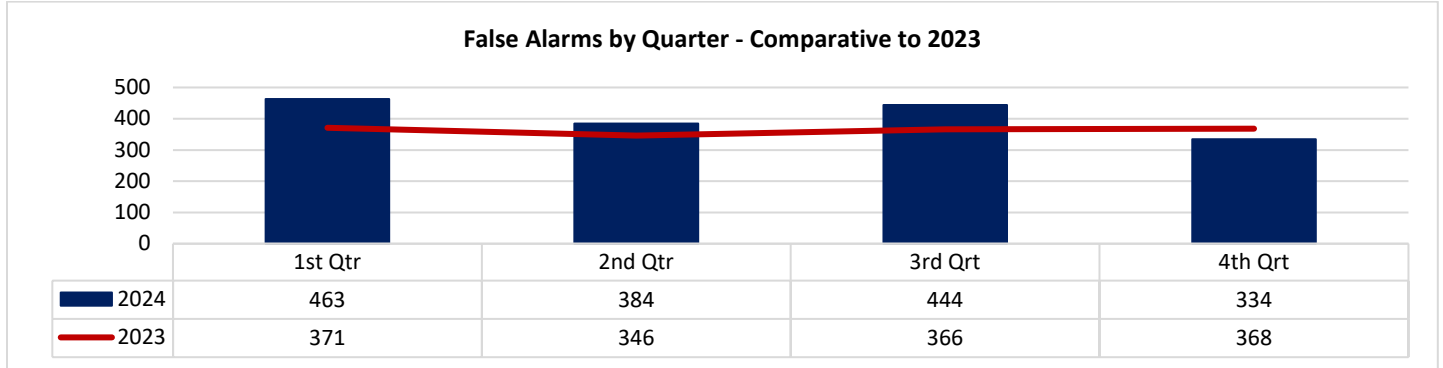
- Crews participated in the Landing's Holiday Tree Lighting Celebration, escorting Santa's arrival and helping to light the tree

False Alarms

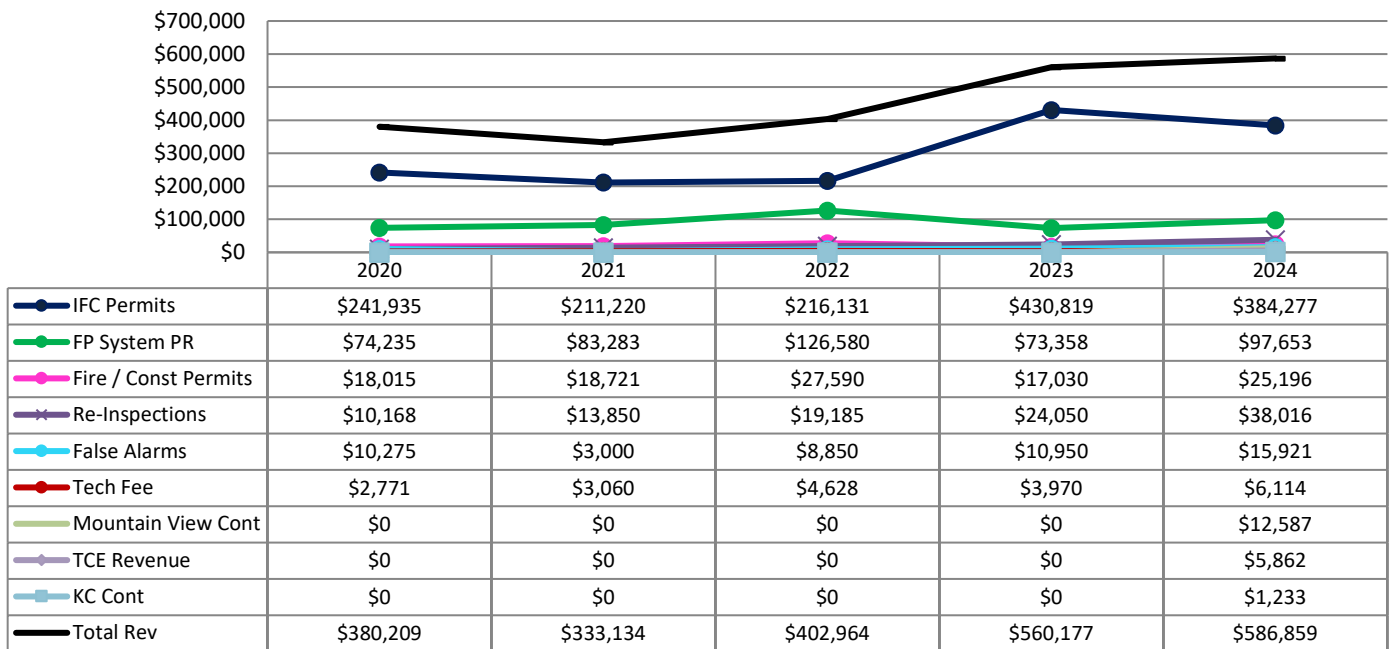
The Department has responded to 1,625 false alarms year to date.

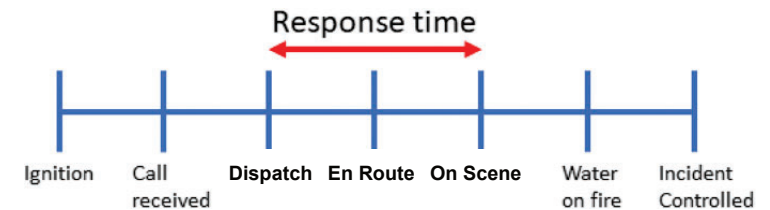
